

PREFACE

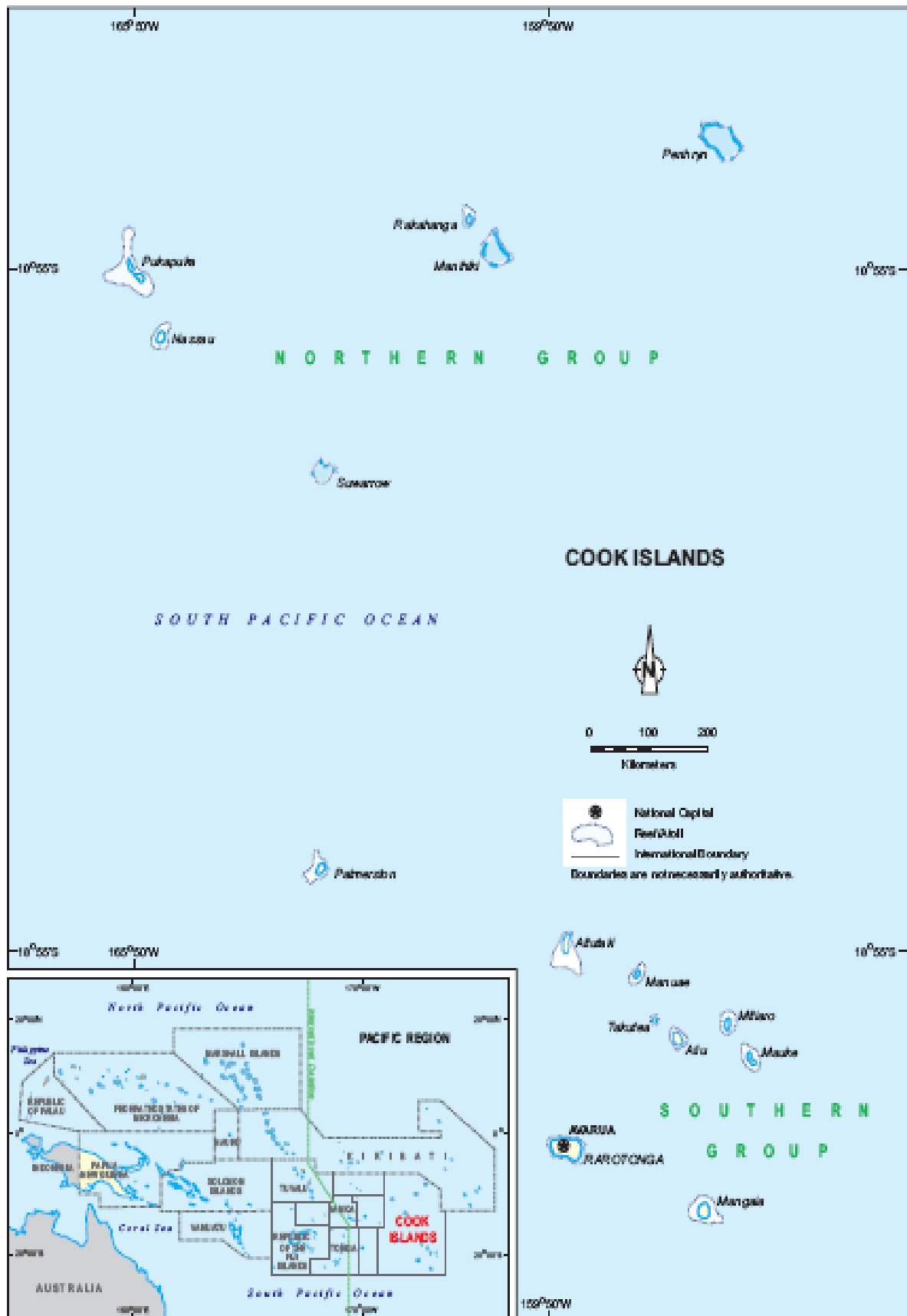
This report presents the Northern Group islands 2006 Census result. This is the second release relating to the 2006 Census, the first was the preliminary results, released in January 2007 soon after the count.

INTRODUCTION

1.1 OVERVIEW

This report presents the final result of the 2006 Northern Group islands population as enumerated on December 1, 2006. A full report combining all of the islands with their unique population characteristics will be produced later in the year. This is an effort to provide data users with a more detailed result of the island populations at the Census District level.

The Northern Group islands (where appropriate will be referred to as North) comprises of seven islands namely Palmerston, Pukapuka, Nassau, Manihiki, Rakahanga, Penrhyn, and Suvarrow and these islands remain relatively isolated from the Southern Group island as well as from the main island Rarotonga.

1.2 ABOUT THE ISLANDS

Palmerston is an atoll made up from the summit of an old volcano, which rises 4,000 meters from the ocean floor. The highest point above sea level is less than 4 meters and the soil of the six motus (islets) along the reef is infertile. However, there are the typical atoll tree crops of coconut and pandanus. Palmerston is a major nesting site for the green turtle, and rare seabirds.

Penrhyn is the largest atoll group in the Northern Group, with a total land area of 9.8 km². There are approximately 53 motus surrounding the lagoon of 60 km², which is one of the largest in the Pacific and can be entered by ocean-going vessels. The highest point above sea level is less than 4 meters and the soil is infertile. Coconut palms, pandanus, and breadfruit trees are the main vegetation. The two main populated islands that make up Penrhyn are Omoka and Tetautua, which are separated by a 10.5 km lagoon. Omoka is considered the main island where the government administration is located and also the location for shipping and air services.

Pukapuka is a coral atoll consisting of three motus situated at the corners of a roughly triangular lagoon. The motu of Wale has a significant area of ancient taro and puraka swamps. There is an 8 km submerged reef to the west of the island from which the island derives its name “Danger Island”. Pukapuka’s highest point above sea level is less than 5 meters and the soil is infertile. Coconut palms, pandanus, puraka (a taro variety tolerant of the harsh atoll environment) and a few breadfruit trees constitute the main vegetation. The atoll is a nesting site for green and hawksbill turtles.

Nassau is a sand cay of 121 hectares, with dense vegetation and a wide reef.

The island of **Rakahanga** is a raised coral atoll, which lies approximately 162 degrees west and 10 degrees south of the equator. It is a rectangular shape of 9 islets, is the third largest island in the northern group, and is the second farthest island from Rarotonga (647 nautical miles). The highest point above sea level is less than 5 meters. The atoll has a shallow, almost landlocked lagoon. Atoll soil is poor: vegetation consists mainly of coconut palms, pandanus, and a few breadfruit trees.

Manihiki is a coral atoll located over 1200 kilometres north of Rarotonga, with its nearest neighbor, Rakahanga, a distance of 44 km away. The total land area of 5.4 km² makes Manihiki the second largest island of the northern group, with a highest point above sea level of under 4 meters. There is no land suitable for both annual and tree crops. The main vegetation is coconut, pandanus, and a few breadfruit trees. The lagoon area of 4,063 ha. constitutes a crucial marine resource.

Environmental features include extensive seabird nesting on isolated motus, turtle nesting grounds, and stocks of blacklip pearl oyster. The existing and potential impact of black pearl oyster production on lagoon ecology is an important environmental issue. Of the uninhabited motus, Porea is significant because it has an enclosed lake in which milkfish (ava) are farmed.

The islands are atoll, which are coral reefs around a lagoon on the top of submerged volcanoes. The total land area of the North is 24.4 square kilometer with a wide span of lagoon and ocean. Indigenous trees such as ngangie and toa

are prevalent on all the islets. Ancient taro swamps are the main source of root crops.

1.3 CONCEPTS AND DEFINITIONS

A full list of definitions and terms used for the Census of Population and Dwellings 2006 is contained in the instruction manual, but the following should be emphasized.

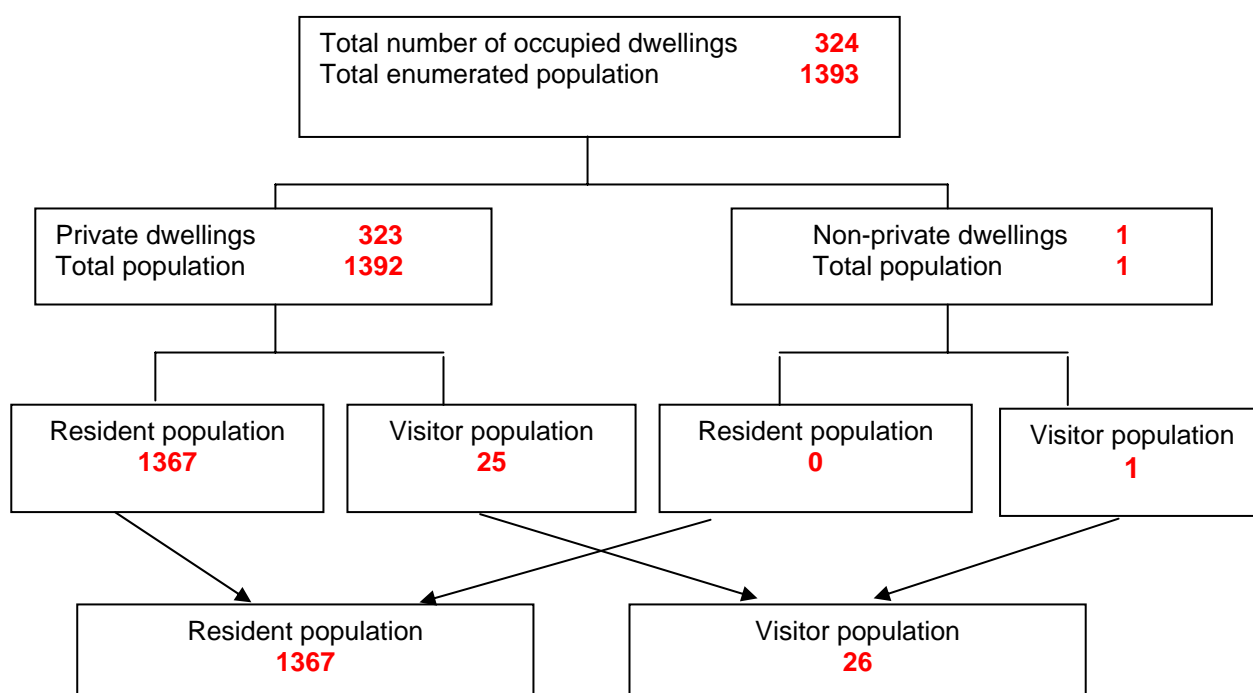
1. Census night is the night between the 30th November and the 1st December 2006. The census time-point is midnight of that night.
2. Dwelling is a building or group of buildings or part of a building occupied by at least one household on census night.
3. Household is a group of persons, related or unrelated, living together sharing the same kitchen and/or contributing to a common budget. One member of the group is regarded as the head. The term family is synonymous in this respect. (Note: a household can consist of one person)

CENSUS ANALYSIS

1.4 POPULATION COMPOSITION

The total enumerated population (including short term visitors, tourists, and temporary contract workers) of the Northern Group islands stood at 1393 people of which 1367 were residents and 26 non resident (visitors). The diagram below provides a simple picture of the composition of the population.

Figure 1: Population composition



The population density varied widely by island. While there were about 390 persons per km² in Pukapuka, there were only 26 persons per km² on Penrhyn Island.

The distribution of the total population also varied considerably by island. Thirty-six percent (507) lived on the island of Pukapuka, 25 percent (353) on Manihiki and 18 percent (254) on Penrhyn island. Overall the total population of the Northern group decreased by 23.7 percent (433 persons) since 2001 (Table 1). The biggest decrease was experienced by Manihiki with 31.5 percent or 162 persons followed by Penrhyn 28.9 percent or 103 persons. With a decreasing population between 2001 and 2006, the population density also decreased from 75 people per square kilometer in 2001 to 57 people per square kilometer in 2006.

The Northern Group resident population consisted of 725 males and 642 females, a fall in both male and female population of 246 males and 176 females. This results in a sex ratio of 1.13, which means that there were 113 men for 100 women.

1.5 SOCIAL CHARACTERISTICS

1.5.1 Migration

Migration pattern is based on the question where one lived one year before the census and five years before the census. Ninety-two (92) percent of the resident population 1 year ago answered that they had not moved from their current (December 2006) place of residence; 4 percent said they had lived on other islands of the Cook Islands, and also 4 percent answered that they had their usual place of residence overseas mainly New Zealand.

Five years before the census, 83 percent of the resident had not moved from their usual place of residence, 7 percent lived on other islands of the Cook Islands, and 10 percent said that they usually reside overseas.

Sixty percent of the total resident populations were born in their usual place of residence; 28 percent were born elsewhere in the Cook Islands, and 13 percent were born overseas (Table 1.09 in the appendix).

1.5.2 Ethnicity

The question on ethnicity asks which ethnic group a person belongs to. Cook Islands Maori made up the bulk of the resident population with 95.6 percent, 2.0 percent were Part Cook Islands Maori, and 2.3 percent were of foreign decent.

1.5.3 Religious denomination

The question asking people to report their religion had been included in every census and instruction was included to indicate that people could object to state their religion. Regardless of this instruction, only 4 people in the Northern Group refused to respond to this question.

The Cook Islands Christian Church (CICC) remains the dominant religious denomination (68.2 percent) of the Northern Group resident population, Roman Catholic the next largest group with 18.5 percent, followed by Seventh Day Adventist Church (SDA) and Assembly of God. It should be noted that the question does not measure the level of commitment or active involvement of persons in their religion.

1.5.4 Disability

The question asks the person to report any disability or health problems they may have lasting six months or more. Eleven percent of Northern Group population aged 15 years and over reported having some sort of disability or sickness. Ailments ranges from blindness, deafness, arthritis, gout, bends, behavioral, old age, etc. The majority, 24 percent is suffering of old age. Twelve percent reported multiple disabilities which also included old age.

1.5.5 Smoking Habits

Thirty-five percent of Northern Group population aged 15 years and over reported that they regularly smoke one or more cigarette or tobacco per day. Fifty percent of the smokers are between the ages of 35 – 54 years.

Six percent of those that do not smoke stated that they used to smoke. As this is the first time a “Smoking” question has been asked in the Census, changes in smoking behaviour cannot be measured. Changes can only be measured by taking a cohort of people say, aged 19 -24 from the previous census (if smoking was asked) and comparing them to those within the 25 - 29 years age group at the time of the 2006 census.

1.6 EDUCATIONAL CHARACTERISTICS

1.6.1 School enrolment

Education in the Cook Islands is free and compulsory from age 5 to 15 years. This has ensured access to primary (grades 1-6) and secondary (forms 1-7) level of education for all. There is little difference in the proportion of males and females enrolled in schools.

Slightly over one percent of the resident population has had no schooling at all. About 61 percent has attended secondary school (Form 1-7¹), and 34 percent attended primary school and the rest, 3 percent are in Pre school.

1.6.2 Educational qualification

The Northern Group population with no educational qualifications was 78.8 percent made up of 42.7 percent males and 36.1 percent females. Almost 16 percent had

secondary school qualifications, and at least 3 persons reported having tertiary qualification.

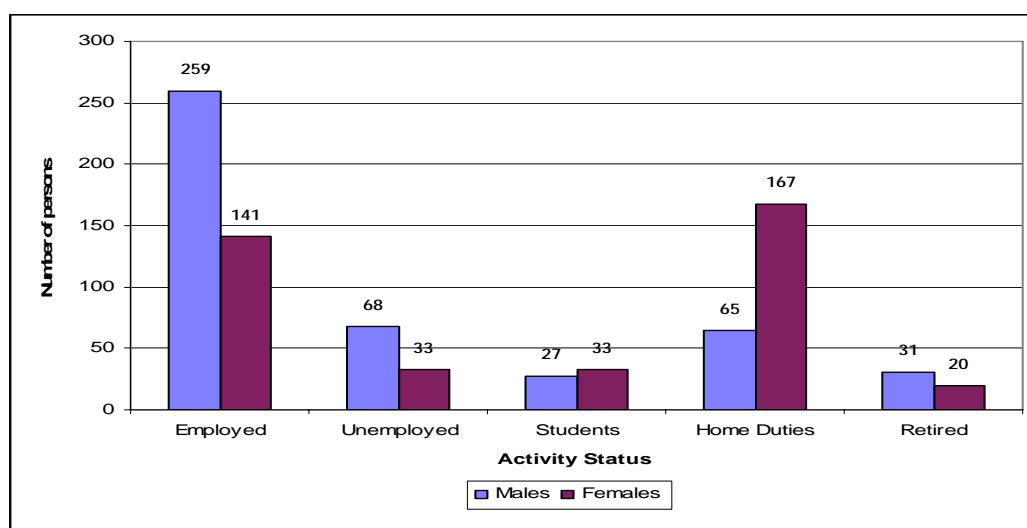
The proportion of people in the Northern Group Islands with no qualifications was much higher on Pukapuka than on any of the other islands.

1.7 ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

1.7.1 Activity status

Out of a total of 844 residents 15 years and older, 59 percent (501) were economically active and part of the labour force² and the rest, 343 was not economically active. The 343 persons included students, the retirees, and those engaged in full time home duties. Nearly 80 percent (400) of the population in the labour force was employed; the other 20 percent (101) were unemployed. The majority, 65 percent of employed persons were males (259) and 35 percent (141) were females.

The biggest occupational group was the category 'Elementary Occupations' with 24 percent of all employees. 'Skilled Agricultural & Fishery Workers' made up nearly

23 percent of the workforce, and 'Professionals' 14 percent. 'Legislators, Senior Officials & Managers' made a big slice of the workforce with 11 percent.

Government is the largest employer in the Northern Group, employing over 62 percent of the employed population. The proportion of public sector employment was high in Pukapuka with 23 percent followed by Penrhyn with 11 percent.

The biggest industry was 'Community, Social & Personal Services' with 57 percent. Another 29 percent worked in the 'Agricultural & Fishing' sector and 4 percent in trading activities. All the industries are dominated by males.

1.7.2 Income

The majority of those residents in the Northern Group earn an income of less than \$5000. Most males were in the income group \$5,000-\$9,999, while most females were in the income group 'less than \$5,000'. Average incomes for all males were approximately \$9,400 and \$6,500 for all females.

Slightly more than half of all females 15 years and older received a benefit, and 21 percent of males. While males received mainly old age pensions and superannuation, females mainly received child benefits and old age pension.

1.8 HOUSEHOLD CHARACTERISTICS

1.8.1 Household size

A total of 324 occupied dwellings were enumerated in the Northern Group; 323 privately occupied and 1 non-private occupied dwelling. The number of private occupied dwellings decreased by 61 compared to 2001. This decrease was very substantial in the islands of Pukapuka, Penrhyn, and Manihiki (Table2).

The average number of persons per household in the Northern Group was 4.2 people compared to 4.8 in 2001, and 5.4 fifteen years ago, in 2001.

Household sizes were higher in Pukapuka with 5.3 persons followed by Nassau and Rakahanga with 4.7 and 4.1 respectively.

Over 10 percent of the population living in privately occupied dwellings lived in households with more than 10 persons per household.

1.8.2 Household composition

Data on household composition was established by identifying a head of household who serves as a reference person to whom all other persons in the household, in terms of family membership, can be related (Table 4).

The majority of all heads of households in the Northern Group were males with nearly 82 percent (265) and 18 percent (59) women.

Seventy-four percent of all household members were husbands, their wives and children (the so-called nuclear family). Almost 12 percent were grandchildren of the household head, 5.7 percent nephew and nieces; 4.2 percent other relatives and the rest were non relatives.

1.9 HOUSING/DWELLING CHARACTERISTICS

1.9.1 Year of construction

Year of construction is very difficult to determine especially for rental dwellings and dwellings belonging to other persons other than those currently occupying the house who have no idea of its year of construction. Since the 1960s there has been a significant increase in the number of private dwellings constructed. During the period 1990-1999, a total of 89 new houses were built, especially on the island

of Manihiki. This could be attributed to the whole islands reconstruction scheme after the devastation effect of Cyclone Martin.

1.9.2 Dwelling tenure

Most of those who live in the North lived in their own houses, that is over 83 percent (268) of the dwellings were owned outright, 10 percent (32) were provided free with job and 4 percent were on a loan repayment/mortgagee scheme.

Rented dwellings totaled 7 or 4 percent of all houses and of these 5 were partly furnished, 1 fully furnished and 1 unfurnished. These houses were rented for less than \$100 per week.

1.9.3 Housing structure

Roofing materials were predominantly iron, 93 percent (302) and Kikau was only used with any significance on Palmerton Island and pandanus the other traditional material was 6 percent used mainly on Nassau. *Please note: There is no differentiation between aluminum and galvanized roofing materials. All have been coded as iron roofing.*

Wall materials is mainly concrete blocks, with 53 percent (172) of all dwellings, followed by wood/timber 21 percent (68) and hardboard 15 percent (49).

The floors were mainly of concrete with 90 percent (290) and sometimes of wood and timber 5 percent (16). Some dwellings with gravel floor still exist in the Northern Group islands.

The average number of rooms per private occupied dwelling in the Northern Group Islands was 5 excluding the kitchen and veranda.

1.9.4 Source and supply of water

There was no public water main system in the Northern Group islands, therefore most households in the Northern Group relied on their own water tank, 80 percent (259) and/or received water from the public water tank/catchments 20 percent (64).

Question on Supply of Water relates only to households using the Public Water Main as their main source of water supply therefore supply of water to dwellings was irrelevant for the Northern Group islands. Drinking water was mainly straight out of the rainwater tanks, 90 percent (292) or 7 percent (23) from the tap and a few, 3 percent (8) either filtered or boiled.

1.9.5 Means of electricity and fuel

Almost all households in the Northern Group islands is connected to the grid and uses the grid as their main means of electricity, 52 percent (167). Solar power in general was used by 28 percent (92) of all private occupied dwellings and own generator by 19 percent (62). However, 1 percent of all households had no electricity at all. Interesting to note is that there is an increase in households using the grid rather than moving to solar or any other renewable energy.

Cooking fuel is predominantly gas throughout the Northern Group with 68 percent (219) of all private dwellings except for Pukapuka and Nassau where firewood is still the main means of cooking.

1.9.6 Means of waste disposal

Burning, burying and disposing household waste in the backyard is still a typical mean of waste management in the Northern group islands.

Over 80 percent (263) of all households disposed of their waste by burning in their backyard. Thirty-six percent (117) of the household had their waste collected by the local authority. Recycling was very low, about 3 percent (9) of all private households indicated recycling their household waste.

1.10 HOUSEHOLD EQUIPMENTS, APPLIANCES AND AMENITIES

1.10.1 Safety equipment

Apart from the availability of emergency lighting, that was present in 47 percent of all private households, safety equipment was mainly absent in the households. Only 3 percent have had a fire extinguisher, only 1 household have a fire safety alarm, 26 percent had a first aid kit, and 24 percent a lantern.

1.10.2 Household appliances and amenities

Since electricity has become available throughout the Cook Islands, the use of electrical appliances for cooking, general household tasks, entertainment and personal care has increased during the last decades.

Some examples include: 98 percent of all private occupied dwellings had a *gas stove* available, 38 percent a *rice cooker*, 20 percent a *microwave*, 92 percent a *electric frying pan*, 40 percent a *toaster*, 98 percent a *freezer*, 48 percent a *washing machine*, 69 percent a *iron*, 91 percent a *TV*, 97 percent a *radio*, 67 percent a *video player*, 84 percent a *drill*, 55 percent a *skill saw* and 24 percent a *grass cutter* (See tables in appendix for other items available to households).

1.10.3 Telecommunication

Over 60 percent of the household have access to phone or fax at home, that is 1 in every 5 households have access to a phone or a fax machine with 13 percent having access to a phone or fax at their work place.

Internet access was installed in a little over 5 percent (17) of the households, mainly found on Manihiki and Penrhyn but other households have access to the internet through their families and friends.

Thirty-four percent of all households had no access to modern communication.

1.10.4 Transport equipment

The census recorded 397 motorcycles, 214 bicycles, 16 trucks and 8 utility vehicles. By far the most vehicles/bicycles were counted on Pukapuka. Motorcars and vans were especially rare in the Northern Group.

A motorcycle was owned by 74 percent (238) of all households, with the highest, 32 percent on Pukapuka followed by Manihiki with 19 percent. At least 41 percent of the households owned a bicycle.

At least 84 percent of the households owned a vehicle while 16 percent owned none at all. It needs to be noted that many households owned several vehicles/bicycles, and at the same time, some had none available.

1.11 HOUSEHOLD AGRICULTURE AND FISHING ACTIVITIES

1.11.1 Agricultural activity

Almost all (87 percent) of the households were involved in agricultural activities, although mainly for their own use (subsistence). Commercial agricultural activity was 2 percent of all households which is very rare in the Northern Group.

The count of all farm machinery during the census shows a very small number of these items are owned by the household. Although over 80 percent of the households indicated involving in some form of agricultural activities it could well mean that there are machines available for household use which are owned by the community.

At least 87 percent of all households either owned livestock or pets. The census counted 2,404 pigs and 3,938 chickens in the North, approximately 7 pigs and 12 chickens per household.

Again, it needs to be mentioned that many households owned many animals, while others did not own any (41 households did not own any animals).

1.11.2 Fishing activity

The majority of the households in the North were involved in fishing activities, although mainly for their own use (subsistence). This was 93 percent of all households. Commercial fishing activity (not including Pearl farming) was 1.8 percent of all households, very rare in the Cook Islands. Of those households that were fishing, most fished both inside and outside the reef. However, fishing inside the reef was the preferred fishing location.

Pearl farming exists only on the islands of Manihiki and Penrhyn. Those households on Rakahanga who are engaged in pearl farming would have a farm or working on a farm on the island of Manihiki. In total there are 69 households engaged in pearl farming and of these 88 percent are located on Manihiki and 9 percent on Penrhyn and 3 percent on Rakahanga.

Scuba set, outboard motor and boat was predominant in Manihiki whereas canoes and fishing rod (local) were predominant on Pukapuka.
